A Wilderness Experience

Have you ever been in a wilderness? Well, it's not quite your favourite tourist destination, albeit there are many cities, like Los Vegas, that are built in a desert. We wouldn't choose to be in a wilderness, but it is often in such places of solitude that strength comes. A wilderness may be defined as 'a desert, a place of desolation or abandonment.'

Jesus was in the wilderness for forty days, where he fasted. Mark's gospel tells us that 'The Spirit sent Jesus out into the desert for forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him.' This was just after Jesus had been baptised, 'when the Spirit descended on him like a dove and a voice came from heaven: You are my Son, whom I love, with you I am well pleased.'

What a tremendous baptism but isn't that sometimes just like life when we are on a high that our world comes crashing down. During his time in the wilderness, Jesus was sustained by the angels. It's good to know should we at times find ourselves to be in a wilderness, that Jesus has gone before us and is able to sustain us.

The wilderness is not all bad, it is the place where learning happens, where God has our attention as we are away from the busyness of life and God can speak and we can listen. A wilderness experience has many facets, physical or mental illness, financial struggles or family traumas. Many people have testified that it was during these 'desert experiences' that they felt God particularly close to them and their faith was strengthened, often feeling upheld by the prayers of others.

In the wilderness Jesus was tempted by the devil, but each time used God's word to combat the temptation. A great model for us when we are tempted to stray from the narrow path and the kingdom of God.

It's important to remember that the wilderness experience doesn't last forever. Jesus was in the wilderness for forty days, after which he came out of desert to begin his earthly ministry. Sometimes, when we are in the middle of the wilderness, it's difficult to see our way out. That's when we may need the help of a friend, a counsellor, a guide. Someone to be with us in the good times as well as the more challenging times of our lives as well as praying to our heavenly Father.

Lent marks the period of forty days from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. It marks the time that Jesus spent in the wilderness. Traditionally, it is a time when Christians give up something, often an item of food.

This year Ash Wednesday is on 5 March and Easter Sunday is on 20 April. I wonder what you will be giving up. Some Christians use this time not so much in giving something up but in doing acts of love, serving others in the community. Of course, such acts should not be reserved for Lent but after a period of six weeks, hopefully a pattern will develop that can be carried on throughout the year.

During Lent, we have a number of special Church Services in Leeds, Broomfield and Kingswood, most notably Mothering Sunday (30 March) and Palm Sunday (13 April). We also have a Lent Group, where we will be viewing and discussing The Chosen, Series 3, which is about the life of Jesus.

Whatever you are planning on giving up or taking on during Lent, my prayer, using the words from the Godspell song, is that we may see the Lord Jesus Christ more clearly, love him more dearly and follow him more nearly day by day.

LEEDS X CASTLE

Well, it feels like this winter just keeps on giving...from high winds to pouring rain, ice to sleet. I am sure I am not the only one counting down to spring arriving!

In an encouraging sign, the snowdrops are now out on the estate, hopefully shortly followed by the crocuses, daffodils and tulips. Our new Gardens and Grounds Manager, John Myers planted an extra 15,000 Spring Bulbs in Autumn so we are looking forward to a good show when the weather improves.

Much work is also underway in the grounds, with the Woodland Garden getting some intensive care and attention to get it ready for the coming visitor season.

January has been a busy month for repairing, conserving and getting the Estate into tip top form for the coming year. We have undertaken plaster repairs to the higher reaches of the Gatehouse Corridor, re-polished the entrance stone in Outer Hall of the Castle & repaired/repointed paving slabs on the East Terrace of the Castle, including fitting new damp proof membrane to prevent water ingress into the boiler plant room.

February Half Term is coming up fast with an event entitled Chaos in the Castle. The concept is that objects in the Castle are misbehaving and moving around in response to the arrival of a peculiar new Desk. Featuring live performers as Lady Baillie's Butler, Mr Borrett and Mrs Hills, her secretary, this will be a magical experience for families. The trail requires families to solve riddles, complete challenges and uncover the secrets behind the chaos. The event is included in the 12-month ticket.

The desk in question is the Secretaire, a stunning hand-painted object created by interior designer, Stephane Boudin for Lady Baillie's

Cream Bedroom in the 1930's. It has not resided at the Castle for many decades, but we are delighted to have acquired it recently with the support of National Lottery Heritage Fund.

We were hoping the Secretaire would arrive in the Castle in time for February Half Term, but it is coming on a ship from the United States and has been delayed by severe weather. Fingers crossed for a timely arrival!

At the end of January, we held a Weddings Fair, showcasing the Castle, Maidens Tower, Battel Hall and Fairfax Hall all dressed in stunning fashion for weddings. We were delighted to welcome over 80 couples to discuss potential weddings at the Castle and everyone was wowed by the stunning floral displays, including floral chandeliers.

Since we changed caterers in 2023 and chefs more recently, the quality of food has gone up enormously with our new caterers Graysons. For all events like weddings, private dinners and conferences, we also offer access to five other excellent caterers, with a wide range of catering offers and price points to suit different requirements.

We have been working with an external consultant over the past few months to establish our Estate Carbon Footprint. We reviewed this recently and will be moving on to develop our plan and realistic timescales for achieving Net Zero Carbon. As you can imagine, with a large estate that operates 24/7 year-round, it is a challenge to achieve this, but we will focus initially on driving energy usage and external procurement down.

We will then plan for replacing fossil fuel-based heating systems with suitable heat pumps over time. (as that charity's finances allow). Finally, once we have reduced carbon emissions to the lowest we can, we will look at offsetting remaining usage, with initiatives like additional tree planting.

Public participation

Two members of the public attended.

Concern over car parking when football matches taking place on the sports field. Clerk to email Loose Lions FC reminding them of their commitment of ensuring driveways in Forge Lane and Brogden Crescent are maintained for residents use and where else drivers to park responsibly. Resident from Brogdon Crescent asked if yellow lines could be considered to ease the problem. The chairman explained that this had been raised before and not only for that area but elsewhere in the village where parking is a problem. Reason for not considering were that no way of enforcing drivers and a reluctance to cover the village verges with yellow lines.

Highway matters


